- Greek and Roman Studies is an interdisciplinary program designed to provide students with linguistic skills through the study of the Greek and Latin languages, as well as an in-depth knowledge of the history and culture of Greece and Rome.
- Students will be prepared to further their interests in language, literature and history at the postgraduate level, whether in this field or others, including medicine, education, law, public service, journalism, publishing, library science, theology and more.
- Students are strongly encouraged to study abroad and pursue archaeological field work opportunities.
- Greek and Latin at IWU are designed both for the student who desires to read ancient literature and for students planning to go into specialized fields that make use of technical terms based on Greek and Latin, such as law and medicine.
