

The Modern Language Association (MLA) Style is widely used in the humanities. The authoritative source is the *MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers, 5th ed.* (1999), call number PE 1478 .M57 1995. It can be found in The Ames Library 1st floor Reference Collection.

MLA instructions for citing electronic media are located in Chapter 4.9 of the manual. The Modern Language Association web site is located at <http://www.mla.org/>. Information about citing electronic resources is accessible from the association home page via the "MLA Style" link (see "Frequently Asked Questions about MLA Style").

According to MLA Style, the citation for an electronic source should include the same information that would be listed for a print source, or as much of that information as is available in the electronic format. The date the web site was accessed and the uniform resource locator (URL, or web address), placed in angle brackets, should be included at the end of the citation.

A reference list prepared using MLA Style should be double-spaced both within and between entries. The second and subsequent lines of an

entry should be indented one-half inch (or five spaces) from the left margin.

Articles or Abstracts From Electronic Databases

To cite an article or abstract retrieved from a fee-based library service such as Academic Universe (Lexis-Nexis), JSTOR, or PsycINFO, follow the standard MLA format for referencing articles.

Include the name of the database from which the material was retrieved, the name of the service through which the database was accessed, the library through which the database was made available, and the date of access.

If known, include the web address of the database service in angle brackets after the date of access.

IN-TEXT REFERENCES

To cite a specific electronic source within the body of text, use a parenthetical reference citation. Include the author's name or the web site address, followed by the page, screen or paragraph number:

"The study of comparative literature," Bill Readings wrote, "takes off from the idea of humanity" (6).

Beethoven has been called the "first politically motivated composer" (Gardiner, screens 2-3).

"The debut of *Julius Caesar* proclaimed Shakespeare's Globe a theater of courage and ideas" (Sohmer, par. 44).

Full references for these sources would be found on the works cited page at the end of your paper:
