- Curriculum introduces students to the Spanish language as it is spoken all over the world, in Spain and the Americas.
- Offers studies in literature and cultural history in addition to language and linguistics.
- Teaches cultural history courses that stress the connections between literature, the other arts and the sociopolitical environment from which they emerge.
- Provides literature courses that sharpen analytical skills and foster greater sensitivity to language as an expression of culture.
- Offers specialized minors for students majoring in either Nursing or Business Administration.
