Why History at Illinois Wesleyan?

- Your degree is enhanced by two required seminar courses: one in theory and writing, and another in historical research.
- You will also take eight additional history courses allowing you to pursue your particular historical interests in depth, concentrating on what you enjoy: a period of time or historical era, an area of the world, or a particular kind of history.
- Your major courses will help you polish your writing and speaking skills through debates, position papers and constant in-class discussion.
- IWU's flexible curriculum allows you to have a minor or second major in fields such as political science, literature, foreign language, economics, or other fields that interest you.
- Whether or not you opt for a second major or minor, you will have the opportunity to take courses outside your major in areas such as English, foreign language and the fine arts, benefiting from our University-wide emphasis on the liberal arts to develop the interdisciplinary tools and perspective that historians need.

- **Gordon J. Horwitz**, *Professor of History*
Ph.D. — Harvard University

A modern Europeanist, teaches a survey of modern world history and more specialized courses about Germany, the Holocaust, Vienna and the two World Wars.

- **Thomas D. Lutze**, *Professor of History*
Ph.D. — University of Wisconsin-Madison

Specializes in Asian history and teaches a wide variety of courses ranging from introductory surveys of China and Japan to focused courses on 20th Century Asia, including WWII in the Pacific, the Chinese Revolution, modern Japan and the Vietnam War.

- **April Schultz**, *Professor of History*
Ph.D. — University of Minnesota

Teaches U.S. cultural and social history, including courses on the history of American women, immigration and ethnicity, and family and childhood.

- **Robert Schultz**, *Professor of History*
Ph.D. — University of Minnesota

Teaches courses on the Progressive and New Deal eras, the transformation of American life and culture that resulted from industrialization, the American West, and American history survey courses.

- **W. Michael Weis (chair)**, *Professor of History*
Ph.D. — The Ohio State University

Specializes in U.S. foreign relations, recent U.S. history, and Latin American history, with a special interest in Brazil.

- **Michael B. Young**, *Professor of History*
Ph.D. — Harvard University

Specializes in early modern England and Europe from the Renaissance to the French Revolution. In addition to his courses on English and European history, he also teaches the sophomore-level seminar required of all history majors that emphasizes skills in analyzing, writing and researching.

Putting Learning into Practice

Graduates of our history program enjoy a number of exciting careers. Many continue specialized study in prestigious graduate programs. Our alumni include many successful lawyers from top Chicago firms, as well as several judges. Indeed, history is a perfect pre-law major. Additionally, several of IWU's history graduates have become involved in political careers both in Springfield and Washington, D.C. Still others have enjoyed exciting careers in journalism, public relations and corporations, as well as in elementary, secondary and post-secondary education.
