Consult with your Advisor about Special Topics or other courses not on the above list.

At least four courses must be taken at the 300 level or above for completion of the major.

At least one 300 level course or above must be completed with the major concentration.

FIELD PLACEMENT INFORMATION

Candidates who elect to take field work for EDUC 125 and EDUC 126 will have the field experience arranged for them by Director of Field Experiences jcrider@iwu.edu.

Students may not arrange their own field experiences.

Students must be professional in dress and demeanor when on school sites.

Reserve a block of time to complete field work between 7:30 – 3:30

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Actual time of field work is dependent upon school/teacher schedules.
Plan for transportation to and from school sites; Candidates are responsible for their own transportation.
Placement may be up to 45 miles from campus.

Field Placement requires candidates to complete a name-based Criminal Background Check (CBC) for most local school districts

- Asst. Director of Teacher Licensure will provide information about name-based CBC's
- Candidates are responsible for CBC fees
- Name-based CBC is good for one year
- CBC's cannot be shared between districts
- CBC's must be renewed each year
