Leanna Horton '22 (BME, Euphonium) was awarded the Presser Award at the School of Music Honors Convocation in April.

Ryan Nateghpour, a student of **Erin Mulliken '90** in the Piano Prep program, received 3rd place at the Illinois Symphony Orchestra guild auditions this year and received a \$300 scholarship toward his Piano Prep tuition for next year.

Braylee Parry '21 (BM, clarinet; student of Moria Tunison) is this year's winner of the Wind Concerto Competition, and she will be attending the University of Kentucky for her Master's degree in the fall.

Dylan Propheter '22 (BME, Tuba) and **Lindsay Ring '21** (BME, Euphonium) were inducted into Pi Kappa Lambda at the School of Music Honors Convocation.

Lindsay Ring '21 (BME, Euphonium) was awarded a full scholarship for Master's studies in Euphonium performance at the University of Michigan, starting in Fall 2021. As the only Euphonium Master's student accepted this year, she will be joining another IWU alum, **Jacob Taitel '20** (BM, Tuba) who is completing a doctoral degree.

Lindsay Ring '21 was also the winner of the Young Adult Wind and Brass category prize of \$16,500 at the Music International Grand Prix in May. The competition was held in Virginia, where semifinalists from the U.S., Canada, Europe, Asia, and Australia performed for a panel of prestigious Judges from the U.S., England, France, and Germany.

Alumnus **Sam Sterbence '13** (BM, Euphonium) and **Lindsay Ring '21** (BME, Euphonium) were finalists for the Euphonium position for the Navy Fleet Band Auditions this past April.

School of Music News

Ralla Klepak Foundation for Education in the Performing Grant Awarded

Two grants totaling \$600,000 have been awarded by the Ralla Klepak Foundation for Education in the Performing Arts to support Illinois Wesleyan University's School of Music community outreach programs, including an expansion of IWU's preparatory programs for local youth, along with the creation of a program that engages individuals with disabilities in music exploration.

A \$400,000 grant over the next three years will fund the Ralla Klepak Community Music Scholars program in an effort to increase access to preparatory music lessons for local disadvantaged youth and students, ages five to 18 years old, who have been traditionally underserved. The program will also diversify the types of instrument instruction and number of students studying those instruments in Illinois Wesleyan's Music Preparatory Programs, which have historically focused on piano and string instruments. Ralla Klepak Community Music Scholars will be encouraged to study voice, brass, woodwinds, percussion, and guitar, in addition to piano and string instruments.

An additional \$200,000 grant over the next three years will fund the Ralla Klepak Community Music Explorers

RALLA KLEPAK FOUNDATION FOR EDUCATION IN THE PERFORMING ARTS Program at Illinois Wesleyan University. Music education majors began working this May with local non-profit social service agencies, such as Marcfirst and Easterseal's Timber Pointe Outdoor Center, to develop and deliver curriculum that enhances existing music exploration programs for individuals with disabilities. Program designs will likely include participant engagement through a general introduction to music, singing, playing instruments, musical games, and instrument building.

Along with serving approximately 2,000 program participants each year, Illinois Wesleyan students will also have the opportunity to engage in research opportunities through the Music Explorers Program — in areas such as sociology, psychology, elementary and secondary education, the humanities, and the arts.

"This grant is a tremendous opportunity for our music education students to provide thoughtful and engaging music experiences to community members with disabilities,"said Assistant Professor of Music Education **Bradley Regier**. "The Music Explorers Program will also be a way for IWU students and faculty to engage in new and exciting avenues of impactful research."

The Ralla Klepak Foundation for Education in the Performing Arts is a private foundation which funds performing arts programs that support the vision of Ralla Klepak (1936-2019), a performing arts enthusiast, an educator, attorney, and a fierce advocate on behalf of disadvantaged youth and individuals with disabilities.

Collegiate Choir

On April 18, the **Collegiate Choir** presented the premiere of the 2020-21 contribution to the Collegiate Choir Commission Series. Composers Kinan Abou-afach (Syrian cellist/composer) and Diego Alonso (flamenco guitarist) each composed a movement of two songs for Hope and Unity. The texts are in Arabic and Spanish. Both composers accompanied the choir on their respective instruments.

Both choirs continue the longstanding tradition of commissions of new choral music: the '21-'22 Collegiate Choir Commission composer will be Reena Esmail and the 2022-23 Collegiate Choir Commission composer will be Imant Raminsh.

Nola Richardson '08



An Australian by birth, Nola has spent most of her life in the United States. She holds a BM from Illinois Wesleyan University and dual MM degrees in Vocal Performance and Early Music from the Peabody Conservatory. She was a young artist with the **Boston Early Music** Festival, a vocal fellow at Tanglewood, a Marc and Eva Stern Fellow at Songfest, and most recently, a Carmel Bach Festival Virginia Best Adams Fellow in 2019. Nola attended the

Faculty News

Dr. Sey Ahn, visiting Assistant Professor of Music and Director of the IWU Symphony Orchestra and Wind Ensemble, was invited as conductor of the Missouri All-State Orchestra comprised of 79 string players whom were recognized during the annual Missouri Music Educators Association Conference. Dr. Ahn also presented a virtual session for the 2020 Louisiana Music Educators Association Conference.

Dr. Jiyoun Chung, composition professor, was the featured guest at the School of Music's Symposium of Contemporary Music. In May, Dr. Chung's compositions were performed at the Musica Prospettiva at Sala Fondazione Torrita Cultura Siena in Italy, the 33rd Pacific Northwest Regional Conference of The College Music Society, and the Society of Composers National Conference.

Dr. Scott Ferguson, Director of Choral Ensembles, is one of 50 international judges for the World Youth & Children Choral Artists' Association's 2021 World Choir Festival to be held virtually in May and June.

Dr. Franklin Larey delivered the keynote address at the IWU Martin Luther King events in January. He also delivered masterclasses and was a guest speaker at the University of Southern California and St. Olaf College, and served on the jury of the New Mexico MTNA Piano Competition.

Dr. Lisa Nelson presented "Solo & Ensemble and Festival: Exploring Works by Women Composers" and "Beyond Suzuki: Elementary Method Books, Pedagogical Repertoire, and Recital Pieces for the Violin/Viola Studio" at the American String Teachers Association National Conference. She also performed Alexander Raichev's Aria for Solo Viola at three regional conferences of the College Music Society.

Dr. Moria Tunison, clarinet professor, published articles in the National Association of College Wind and Percussion Instructors Journal this spring: "Lefèvre's Third Concerto Viewed Through the Lens of His Méthode de Clarinette: An Argument for Historical and Pedagogical Performance Practice"; "Teaching Younger Students During COVID"; "Creating a Meaningful Studio Class for a Small Studio." She was a finalist at the 2020 International Clarinet Association Research Competition for her research on Lefèvre. She also was appointed to the International Clarinet Association Youth Committee and served on the committee's panel "Connecting the Pre-Professional Clarinetist to Digital Clarinet Resources in the 21st Century: Approaches, Ideas, and Discussion" as part of the ICA Plays On! professional conference.

Saxophone **Professor Glenn Wilson's** non-profit Further Jazz, Inc. received a \$1,500 grant from Illinois Prairie Community Foundation to produce concerts at the Normal Theater involving jazz films/concerts. The IWU Jazz Festival has been awarded a grant from the IPCF for \$2,100 to produce the 2022 Jazz Festival.
