<b>A clear statement that speaks directly to the goals of this award, with clear example(s) of how the applicant will use and integrate scholarly or artistic collections (e.g., archives, museums, databases, journals, data, images, musical works, etc.) during the development of the project</b>	The proposal makes a clear, specific, and compelling case that their research will fulfill the goals of the award, with specific examples.	The proposal makes a tentative case for how their work will fulfill the goals of the award, with moderate specificity.	The proposal does not refer to the goals of the award or provide specifics/examples.
<b>A description of the significance of the project to the student's development as a researcher or creator</b>	The proposal clearly communicates to the reader that the proposed research will have a significant impact on the students' development as a researcher/creator. <b>A description of the relationship of the work to the student's field of study or interests</b>	There is a clear and robust description of how the project relates to the students' field/discipline. <b>A well developed, feasible timeline that indicates the project will be completed by the end of the following academic year</b>	Timeline is feasible, detailed, and consistent with activities described.	Timeline lacks some detail but the project is manageable in the time frame described.	Timeline is unsuitable and/or unrealistic for activities described.
<b>Overall Quality of Application</b>	Application materials are well written and well organized. The project is understandable to a professional outside of the discipline.	Application materials are generally well written and well organized, but the application includes some jargon or is sometimes hard to understand for a professional outside of the discipline.	Application materials are hard to understand and may use much field-specific jargon. It may not be clear that the student wrote the materials on their own.
