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ulty and staff at Illinois Wesleyan, who feel it is their job to go beyond teaching textbook material and students to become engaged citizens. "Often while on campus, students have very little contact with McClean County. It's not just corn and soybeans out there," Simeone said.

With this in mind, Delicath compiled a presentation highlighting how some IWU students have already broken through the bubble and what future students can continue to accomplish if given the opportunity.

Five student projects from the Action Research Center (ARC) were used as examples in the proposal to City Manager David Hales and Mayor Steve Stockton. Two included were alumnus Ryan Lambert's 2010 survey of crime in the city of Bloomington, which became a helpful aid to the Bloomington police department, and alumna Lindsey Haines's work with the West Bloomington Revitalization Project (WBRP), which "galvanized WBRP's housing focus," according to Simeone.

The success of projects like these and the positive reputation ARC has gained in recent years created a better environment for the internship to come to fruition, and the opportunity Simeone and Renner sought 15 years ago now

presented itself.

"I know the city administration is eager to work with the students and to learn from them as they develop their assignments. This will be a great opportunity for students to engage in understanding and supporting municipal government, and for the municipality to benefit from our students' great work," said University Librarian Karen Schmidt, who serves as a member on the Bloomington City Council.

It was Schmidt, along with fellow city council member Jennifer McDade, who formally proposed the idea to Hale and Stockton. McDade has served the city since April of 2009 and is currently coordinator of the ISU Center for Teaching, Learning and Technology.

A call to apply for the internship was sent out to students of all majors from both universities. The six selections were announced after this issue of the Argus went to press, but the chosen students will participate in the internship during the 2012 spring semester.

And though the internship is the brain child of Simeone and Renner, Simeone stressed it took more than a dream to make the new internship possible.

"There were a variety of factors that went into this. Tari and I had our idea and were committed to it, but without all these other players, it wouldn't be possible," Simeone said. "It's a lesson in how things get done. It's never just one person—it's always a team effort."

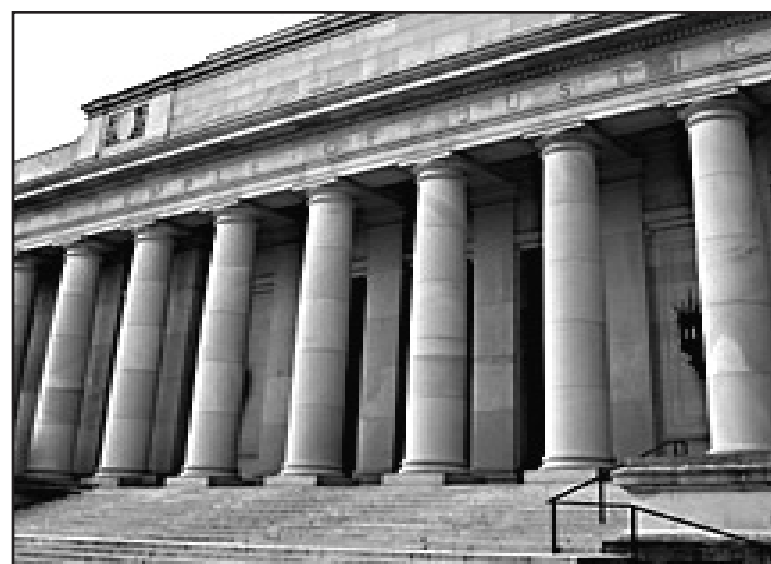


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
