OPTOMETRY

Doctor of Optometry (OD)







NATURE OF WORK

Optometrists examine the eyes and other parts of the visual system. They also diagnose and treat visual problems and manage diseases, injuries, and other disorders of the eyes. They prescribe eyeglasses or contact lenses as needed.

LENGTH OF PROGRAM

Four years of optometry school with optional one-year residency.



COURSE REQUIREMENTS

The most common prerequisites for students applying to optometry schools are listed below. However, depending on the program, additional coursework may be required. Check individual program websites or the Association of Schools and Colleges of Optometry's (ASCO) Optometry Programs Admissions Directory (https://optometriceducation.org/) for program- specific requirements.

Ultimately, it is the responsibility of the applicant to know the exact requirements and deadlines for each school to which they apply.

• One year of general chemistry CHEM 201/CHEM 202

• Organic chemistry CHEM 311/312

One year of physics
 PHYS 101/102 or PHYS 105

• Schools may require English, cell biology, genetics, math (recommend through Math 176; Calculus I) and/or other courses

*Only Biology majors interested in pursuing a career in optometry should take BIOL 101/102; all other majors should take BIOL 107/108.

APPLICATION TIMELINE

The application timeline is unique depending on when you are prepared and ready to pursue optometry school. If you plan to apply directly after graduating from IWU, you'll want to complete the prerequisite courses by the end of your junior year and apply during the summer before senior year. If you choose to take a gap year, you should complete your prerequisites by the end of your senior year and can then apply the summer after graduation OR whenever you are ready.

Students today are often waiting a year or more after graduation before applying to a health professions school. This does not put the applicant at a disadvantage; many programs look favorably upon applicants who have taken an extra year or two to mature and gain work experience, and who can thus make a better decision regarding a career in health professions; see "Make the Most of Your Gap Year" (https://students-residents.aamc.org/applying-medical-school/article/making-most-your-gap-year/).

APPLICATION SERVICE

OptomCAS (www.optomcas.org) is the centralized application service for applicants for optometry schools. Check the application service and specific optometry school websites for deadlines.

STANDARDIZED TEST

Typically, the OAT (Optometry Admission Test) is required of applicants for optometry school. The OAT consists of four sections: Survey of the Natural Sciences, Reading Comprehension, Physics, and Quantitative Reasoning. The test takes about 4 hours and is offered nearly every day of the year; see www.ada.org/oat for additional information.
